I STARTED AT A DIFFERENT

school and my grades weren't that great. Monroe College was one of the few schools that actually looked past those grades. They looked at me as an individual. They gave me an opportunity to prove myself once again. I was working full-time at the time. Monroe had many different options that just worked perfectly with a working adult. A lot of us were in the same boat. We were all trying to maintain our lifestyles while also supporting our families. A lot of really great friendships were formed at that time. We were all trying to make ourselves that much better by attending Monroe and during the little bit of free time that

MONROE COLLEGE CAME TO the Virgin Islands to do recruiting, and it stood out for me. As a child, I always spent Christmas and summers in New York, so it was a perfect opportunity to go back to New York while going for my education. When I got there, I was undecided, so they had me in information technology. I wasn't interested in it, so I started to look at the different degree programs. The Criminal Justice Program was newly introduced, and after looking at the career opportunities having a criminal justice degree would provide, it sparked my interest. Professor Wilford Pinkney was one of the hardest professors I had at Monroe College, and he said, 'Nothing in life is ever given to you. You have to work.' It was a seniorlevel course. We started with a class of 27 people, and there were only ten of us who finished the class. It was challenging at times, but he motivated me. He went back to college in his 30s and got his master's in his 40s. He was even pushing

for his doctorate at that point, so it was encouraging to know that there was no starting or ending point for getting your education. When I started, we stayed in apartments, and I had full access to our kitchen to cook. My second year was when the dorm was built, so we were the first students in the hall. Being in a building with your fellow college students and having full access to everyone developed longtime relationships and friendships. It was a positive experience, and I liked that Monroe provided independent living where we had our apartment. It taught me a lot about adulthood. After graduation, I moved back home because of the job market. My initial dream job was to be a probation or parole officer. It didn't happen, so I chose a different career path. I went into grants writing, and with my grants management experience, I landed a job with the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Monroe means community, family, and friendship.

I GREW UP IN A HOME WHERE

College is much different from middle school, high school, or elementary school. I loved the staff; they were very helpful in assisting me. In the process of setting up and choosing my classes and my scheduling, the professors were very helpful in explaining all the academics, curriculums, syllabuses, and

requirements. They were very good at explaining. I learned a lot from Monroe. To this day, I remember my time at Monroe and it has contributed to my everyday skills. I'm very good with Microsoft Office, the entire programming: Access, Excel, PowerPoint, and Word. I use all those skills to this day. All of the professors left an impression on me. I took a tax class when I went back for my BA degree, and I did not understand math whatsoever, but he was extremely helpful in helping me understand. The first job that I received post-graduation was through Monroe College, and that started my career in the non-profit industry as an administrative assistant and office manager. With all of the positions that I've had all throughout my career, the employers all loved the fact that I had attend Monroe College. It's amazing how much of an impact Monroe really does have on people and how so many corporations have such great knowledge about Monroe.


WHEN I WAS IN HIGH SCHOOL, I WAS

undocumented, so I had no opportunities to advance my academic career further. One day Lisa Scorca told me about the great things at Monroe College and how they would be able to offer me an opportunity to advance my academic career, so I filled out an application, and got an acceptance letter. I did not know how I could afford college, but I was able to write essays to receive scholarships to support my first semester at Monroe. I took advantage of the payment plans that Monroe offered, and they also offered me a partial scholarship, but it still left about \$3,000 to be paid, so I took a job as a camp counselor at a church in St.

Albans, Queens. I took accelerated courses, and I was able to get my associates in one year. I signed up for their Criminal Justice Program. I could not afford textbooks, so I would go to the library and pay five cents a page to photocopy the pages of the chapters that I needed. I finished in December 2007 and I walked in April 2008. I am very proud of myself because I did something that as an undocumented immigrant in this country did not seem possible, and I was the first one in my family to graduate with a college degree. In 2008 I was able to get an opportunity to work for Alpha Outsourcing Services Corporation, and after the project finished in 2010, I was out

of a job for about six months. In September 2010, I got an opportunity to be a receptionist at BDO. I talked to some folks on the floor, and I was able to maneuver my way into receiving a temporary position in that group. They took interest in me, so by February 2012, I was hired full-time by the company. I went back to school and did my master's while working full-time. It was hard, but it set me up for success. I have been working for BDO for ten years, and I have been promoted to the senior manager position. I could not have done it without Monroe's support.




I WANTED TO GO TO AN ACTUAL SCHOOL. I WAS A

I was then promoted to a project associate and started running projects as well as the chairman's office at the same time. I was promoted to a project manager a year before I graduated with my master's degree. I was progressively climbing, which was good, that was the plan. For my master's degree, during the last semester, I was going to Monroe's Bronx campus for a class. It was a really great



I finished the coursework at Monroe when I came to the US a few years ago. I could've finished it quicker because I had a 4.0 GPA and was willing and able, but at the time, I didn't see any change occurring in my current situation. I waited until I was settled because I also started a new job in the US. The overall experience was great, and I really liked the online environment. The coursework was very relevant and some of the courses were preparation for popular industry IT certification exams, which you could take to get extra credentials. That was a huge plus! The experience enabled me to better understand the systems used for accounting and reporting. It also led me to know what to anticipate from the various systems. Most of the time, when organizations put new systems in place that record and analyze data, they often don't utilize all the features in their day-to-day operation. Because of the skills and experiences learned while at Monroe, I am able to offer deeper insights and solutions with greater impact.
